We have much to learn from others in the world, but we in turn have much to offer global practitioners in terms of our longterm experience of treating wounds in a warm climate, with all the problems that entails. In fact, it is my strong belief that we all have something to share and learn from each other, and the WUWHS 2020 Congress provides a truly global platform through which we will pool our knowledge and experiences.

So, I welcome all of you who have been able to make the trip to the beautiful and friendly city of Abu Dhabi. I truly hope you enjoy a unique and vibrant learning and cultural experience while you are here in the UAE. The educational outputs don't just stop with the Congress. In collaboration with Wounds International, we have produced a range of WUWHS 2020 Consensus and Best Practice documents that you can collect at the Congress and they can also be shared electronically with your colleagues to magnify and extend the reach of the WUWHS. We look forward to continuing many of these activities over the next 4 years of my presidency.
